

Tribal Peoples of Brazil

Many of the tribal people I know are very religious. They have in their belief systems a creator god, lesser gods who rule the natural world, and a host of spirits which they contact through their witch doctors. They are also very superstitious, and live in great fear. It is interesting that many have in their oral traditions stories of a great flood, a coming messiah, and the end of the world. Some worship their deity as the supreme sovereign god, and in other cultures their gods are human-like, deviant, and even cruel.

Not all people groups have concepts common to the western world. Most understand the concept of sin since they know right from wrong. They have their own laws and codes (Romans 2:12-14) and abide by or break them.

Their cultures are as diverse as trees in the forest. One tribe holds treachery as their highest virtue, another takes anything from you that you haven't used in two or three days, the reason being that if you haven't needed it for that long, you don't need it at all. One missionary was almost killed because he began eating the chickens he was raising. The elders called him before the council and demanded to know why he was killing those he had so carefully cared for, fed, and protected, even building them a house. They told him it was okay to eat the eggs, just not kill the chickens.

Most of the tribes live in villages, and are fairly well organized. They have hunting parties, groups for garden making, fruit and jungle products gatherers, basket and mat weavers, and so on. They are very conscious of age, status, and hierarchy, and respect is paid to all, whether mail or female. Living community style, they share all food, work, and responsibility.

The jungle life is a hard existence, and survival is a daily concern. They are, generally speaking, a happy people, not having many of the burdens of "civilization." They have festival days, celebrations, and feasts. They have their problems, which include infanticide, murder, war, fighting, and cruelty. There is drug abuse: caxirí, padú, paricá, and others. Human nature is the same all over the world. They do all have one thing in common: they need someone to declare Jesus to them. Because of their beliefs and traditions, most tribes readily receive the Good News, and by God's Spirit, will accept Jesus as their Lord and Savior. John 9:36b -"...who is he, Lord, that I might believe on Him?"

News from Haiti

& the Dominican Republic

Ron & Kathy Valerio (Dominican Republic) write, "Greetings from the Dominican Republic. Thank you for your prayers as we help with groups coming into the Dominican Republic on their way to Haiti to help in various capacities. Our second group came in last Thursday. It consisted of medical personnel and church members from Amarillo, TX. They were able to take in a lot of food and medical supplies to a missionary in Port Au Prince. Prayers sustain and protect us. On Saturday, the group headed back to the Dominican Republic. After entering, they encountered a group of men who were possibly protesting the electric situation, not getting enough water, or other reasons they are angry about, or a group of thieves on the road. We don't know. First they threw a rock through the bus window (hoping to disable the driver). It missed him by about 12 in. Then our group came to burning tires that had been placed across the road in order to stop the bus. The driver, gunning the engine, drove through the tires, opening a path for those behind them. A tire, on fire, stuck to the bottom of the bus, but the fire went out and they were able to get it off. The Lord protected these folks and we believe that praying Christians had a great part in this. Your prayers are very important to us and those we work with in the Dominican Republic. We thank you again for your tremendous prayer support!!!

Steve & Mary Earlywine (Mexico) write, "The mission had a busy month of December with special programs. We had a great time with Melissa Houston and her muppets (56 people present]. We were able to prepare 18 boxes [of food, toys & gifts] for the families of the Mission. He said there was a man who lives up on top of the mountain that we need to talk to. When we got up there we found a 65-year-old man who accepted Christ as Savior and asked us to come back. Mary needs new hearing aids (\$1400).
