HOW TO BETTER PRAY FOR OUR MISSIONARIES

Brethren, pray for us. I Thes. 5:25 By Ron Valerio

"Brethren, pray for us." This was the request of the great Apostle Paul. Paul was a missionary sent out from the local church at Antioch. He could have spent the rest of his life teaching the converts at Antioch. He could have refused God's leading and the Holy Spirit's pressure on his heart. He could have done so, but he would have been out of the will of God for his life. He surrendered his heart and accepted God's call on his life. "Brethren, pray for us." This was the plea from a man in the perfect will of God.

Aside from the Lord Jesus Christ Himself, Paul the Apostle was the greatest and most influential missionary of all time. "Brethren pray for us." This was the request of the missionary who brought the Gospel to Europe. This was the request of the great Apostle who penned fourteen of the twenty-seven books of the New Testament. Paul's request was a plea from a missionary's heart. And it is the plea from the heart of every blood bought, God-sent missionary today. The plea is that the believers of the local church would engage in the most vital task of the missionary endeavor- intercessory prayer, or praying on behalf of someone else.

Now, if the great Apostle Paul needed and pleaded for the prayers of others, then every God-sent missionary needs the prayers of others. I suppose there are literally hundreds of areas of prayer that the missionary needs. We

could and should pray for the missionary's relationship with God. We should remember their physical and emotional needs. Praying specifically for the missionary's family is vitally important as they make their home in a foreign land, often far removed from everyone they have ever known. Let's not forget their financial needs. Missionaries seem to always have endless needs to do the work of the Lord. A Korean missionary stood up in a mission conference and said in broken English, "GOSPEL FREE-MISSIONARY COSTS MUCH!" A price tag cannot be put on the souls of men. The human soul is of infinite value. The fulfillment of the Great Commission must go forward on the wings of prayer.

So many in our churches with good intentions pray a general prayer like, "Lord, bless all our missionaries around the world, everywhere. Amen." However, specific prayers get specific answers! The Word of God reveals to us some of missionary Paul's specific prayer requests:

PRAY FOR WORDS TO SPEAK.

"And for me, that utterance may be given unto me..." Eph. 6:19a. Every missionary needs prayer for the words to speak. Missionaries deal daily with cultural and language differences. They are declaring the message of eternal life to the lost. Their culture cannot save them. Their government cannot save them. They cannot save themselves. The only hope people have is a clear presentation of the Gospel. My wife Kathy and I attended a family retreat. The guest speaker was a veteran missionary to Africa. He challenged us to commit to memory Psalm 19:14, "Let the words of my mouth and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O Lord, my strength and my redeemer." May the missionary's words be acceptable to the Lord and spiritually profitable to men.



ONCE UPON A TIME A MAN GOT A HAIRCUT IN THE DEVIL'S BARBERSHOP

Early in his life Samson had special encounters with God. At times the Spirit of the Lord moved him (Judges 13:25). Having received a divine appraisal of the kind of boy he would be, Samson's parents should not have been surprised when unusual things began to happen in his

What if he came face-to-face with a lion? Did not the Spirit of God come upon him to imbue him with physical strength to rend the lion in two, as one would rend a kid (14:5,6)?

What if he confronted thirty men of Ashkelon (vs. 19)? Was not the same Spirit upon him that enabled him to destroy the lion barehanded?

What if a thousand Philistines were arrayed against him? Did not the same Spirit come mightily upon him with supernatural strength to kill them with the jawbone of a donkey (15:14-16)?

What if, after a lapse of faith, at which time he got a haircut in the Devil's barbershop, he found himself in a weakened condition? Did he not, though blind and bent, kill more in his death than he did in his life (chapter 16)?

The Barbershop Experience

Recorded in Judges 16:4-30 is the sad saga of a man who lost his strength when his hair was cut in defiance of the edict that had been issued by God that no razor would come upon his head (Judges 13:5-7). Disregard of God's imperatives or disobedience to God's commandments results in defeat in the life of the most ardent soldier of the cross.

Samson had a great deal going for him, but, in a moment of weakness, much was taken from him. Allowing his head to be shaved by Delilah rendered him weak and helpless to defend himself against the enemy (16:16-21).

Samson did not fall out of favor with God in a single act; he gradually lost out degree by degree. Nor does a believer in today's environment lose his religion in a "blowout"; he loses it by a "slow leak!"

Let us be on guard against the wiles of the Devil lest he get a toehold that leads to a foothold and ultimately to a stronghold that reduces us to spiritual weaklings who are unable to cope with satanic allurements or quench the fiery darts of the wicked.

Practical Applications and Lessons

Something can be learned from the life of anyone to whom one is exposed, whether it be in a personal involvement or from a biographical account, as in the case of Samson. What an experience it would have been to know this mighty man in person! Who among us would not like to have been on the scene of the killing of the lion or the slaving of a thousand men with the jawbone of the ass. What a mind-boggling thing it would have been to witness the collapse of the Philistine theater!

Although we cannot boast of having seen any of these miraculous feats, we can, by the eye of faith, see them clearly unfold as they leap from the pages of the inspired record. Let us learn from the Holy Spirit, the Teacher whom Jesus promised would "guide us into all truth" (John 16:13).

- I. Samson, in the midst of adversity, proved himself to be an effective warrior. We too can be victorious in the fight of faith if we are attired in the divine armor suit (Eph. 6:11-18)
- 2. Samson, though succumbing to the temptations of the Evil One, came through the experience refined for God's glory. We too can survive the trials, troubles and tribulations and exit the furnace remade and remolded (I Peter 5:10).
- 3. Samson, after rising to fame and losing it, regained his strength through prayer to enhance his rating once again (Judges 16:28-30).

Reexamining the life of Samson is an experience replete with examples of weakness and strength. We see him rise to the highest and sink to the lowest. In the end he is restored to favor with God, who grants him strength to destroy those who tried in vain to destroy him.

Though unstable, unpredictable and, at times, undependable, Samson proved to be unflinching, unflappable and undefeatable!
